Our values and the laws governing warfare teach us to respect human dignity, maintain our integrity, and do what is right. Adherence to our values distinguishes us from our enemy. This fight depends on securing the population, which must understand that we - not our enemies - occupy the moral high ground. This strategy has shown results in recent months. Al Qaeda's indiscriminate attacks, for example, have finally started to turn a substantial proportion of the Iraqi population against it.

In view of this, I was concerned by the results of a recently released survey conducted last fall in Iraq that revealed an apparent unwillingness on the part of some US personnel to report illegal actions taken by fellow members of their units. The study also indicated that a small percentage of those surveyed may have mistreated noncombatants. This survey should spur reflection on our conduct in combat.

I fully appreciate the emotions that one experiences in Iraq. I also know firsthand the bonds between members of the "brotherhood of the close fight." Seeing a fellow trooper killed by a barbaric enemy can spark frustration, anger, and a desire for immediate revenge. As hard as it might be, however, we must not let these emotions lead us - or our comrades in arms - to commit hasty, illegal actions. In the event that we witness or hear of such actions, we must not let

From the President's Desk—

Since the start of the war on terror in Iraq and Afghanistan, the sacrifice has been enormous. In the time period from the invasion of Iraq in March 2003 through now, we have lost a total of 3,140 soldiers. As tragic as the loss of any soldier is, consider this: below is a list of deaths of soldiers while actively serving in the armed forces from 1980 through 2004:

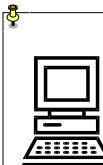

Bill's Bills

The Easter Bunny has come and gone, as has Mother's Day. Memorial Day is upon us, as is Father's Day. Yet the two hottest legislative items in Sacramento are still very much unformed or up in the air.

The Governor's health plan. There is still not a single bill in the legislature that contains any element of the health insurance "reform" plan proposed by the Governor. As noted before, even though all the deadlines for introducing bills have passed, rules and deadlines have little if no meaning in the Capitol. But still, it is more than a bit strange that while negotiations continue between all parties, nothing yet has been put in the form of legislation. The Democrats, performing true to their decades old script, proposed an insurance plan that would cover **fewer** people than the Governor's proposals but cost considerably **more**. Nice to know some things never change.

The budget. Spending in the Governor's proposed budget increases both in year over year and in inflation adjusted dollars – yet the Democrats are complaining about "cuts". See, in the Democrat arithmetic book, if they propose a 7% increase in a program, and the Republicans propose only a 3% increase in a program, the GOP has proposed a 4% "cut"! Wrestling and wrangling on the budget has just commenced as of Mid-May, and you can expect the mud bath to continue through much of June. Even in the Governor's "post partisanship" never-never land, budgets are going to be tough unless the GOP just roles over and gives the Democrats everything they want. The Governor did basically this last year on minimum wage and drug-cost issues, but the legislative GOP is not likely to go along this year with similar tactics. This could get ugly – but will also be interesting for political circus watchers.

Here is a sampling of what **you** could be wrestling with if you were a legislator:

***AB512, Lieber, D – Mountain View.** Lieber, famous for her "spank your child go to jail" proposal, has another doozy. This one would mandate that residential mortgage documents be translated in languages other than English, even if all parties involved in a transaction speak English and nobody requests it.

***AB 221, Joel Anderson, R- San Diego.** Joel is one of the brightest lights of the GOP legislatures class of '06. This bill, which may actually pass as it has several Democrat co-authors, would mandate all state agencies to divest themselves of investments in Iran. No reason our investment dollars should be propping up the lunatics ruling Iran.

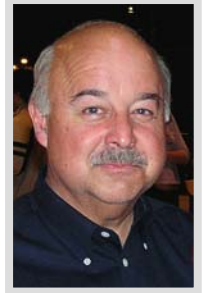
***SB 973, Simitian, D – Palo Alto.** Requires California to adopt a list of "chemicals of concern" based on a **Canadian** list of harmful substances. If you're a business owner, just what are you supposed to do with this?

***SB 840, Kuehl, D-Santa Monica.** Sort of the official Democrat answer to the Governor's socialized health care plan. The Kuehl socialized health care plan is even worse, costing billions of dollars more and turning California into North Korea.

***AB 84, Nakanishi, R- Elk Grove.** 40 + states currently give their residents tax breaks for setting up individual health savings accounts. This bill would do the same for Californians. The Democrats – surprise – are opposed, as it would "cost" the state money, which as we know is much more important to Democrats than protecting the financial and physical health of our citizens.

*** AB 751, Lieu, D – Torrance.** Circle this day! Here's an actual pro-business bill from a Democrat. This would expand existing research and development (R & D) tax credits.

*** AB 9999, Saracino, R – Glendale.** Mandates that a dry, Bombay martini be designated as the official adult beverage of California. At last, some sanity in Sacramento!

PROPOSITION R—Legal Challenge Update

(LA City Council term limit extension-ethics reform)

Is "justice delayed, justice denied?" We will know soon enough. It seems like a lifetime ago that Judge Robert O'Brien ruled that Proposition R violated the Constitution by combining two unrelated issues into one proposition and ordered the measure off the November 2006 Ballot. The following day, supporters of the proposition, appealed the lower court ruling and Prop. R was put back on the ballot.

As a result, many LA voters assumed the measure was found to be constitutional and that the matter had been resolved. But they are mistaken. When it was appealed to a higher court, the hearing date was set for a date after the election. It was only placed back on the ballot pending the appeals court hearing and ruling. Following the election, the petitioners withdrew their legal challenge and the

Chairman's Report

The state legislature has taken the first steps to adopt three important elections bills affecting the Republican Party in California.

AB 1430 is sponsored by **Assemblyman Martin Garrick** and will **protect the member communications of political parties** and other membership organizations from the encroachment of local government regulation. State law makes clear that political parties and other groups have a right to communicate with their members without interference, but some local agencies have recently sought to interfere with the free exercise of this right. The measure passed the Assembly on a vote of 77-0.

AB 965 is sponsored by **Assemblyman Joel Anderson** and cleans up sections of the elections code to bring it in line with recent court rulings that **recognize the California Republican Party's right to set its own rules and procedures**. The measure passed the Assembly on a vote of 76-0.

Congratulations to Assemblyman Garrick, Assemblyman Anderson, and **Assemblyman Anthony Adams**, Vice Chair of the Assembly's Elections and Redistricting Committee for their special work on AB 1430 and AB 965.

SB 293 is sponsored by **Senator Dick Ackerman** to resolve a conflict involving the current Elections Code deadline for the Secretary of State's notification of the names of Presidential and Vice Presidential nominees for the November 2008 general election. Existing law would have had that deadline pass prior to the 2008 Republican national convention. The bill passed the Senate without opposition.

Please let me know if you have any questions on any of these elections bills. Thank you for your leadership as we continue working to build a world class Republican Party in California.

Patrick Owens and I were down at the LA City Clerk's Election Office today for the final vote counting in Roy Burns' campaign for the Los Angeles Community College Board of Trustees. Despite support from RPLAC and the Lincoln Clubs, Roy came up **238 votes short out of over 133,000 votes cast**.

While Roy did not win, his campaign demonstrated that it is possible for Republicans to win nonpartisan elective offices, even in heavily Democrat Los Angeles. Extremely low voter turnout means that organizational efforts and contributions carry a lot of weight. Every vote we can turn

out in races with a turnout of 10% or less is worth 10 votes. Every dollar we can give in a low fundraising nonpartisan race is worth \$10 in impact. Patrick Owens and Dan Carraso carried the lion share of the financial burden in this campaign. We are all very grateful for their leadership and their ability to see the possibility of Republican victory that so many others couldn't. Thank you Dan and Patrick!

Roy is very appreciative of all his Republican friends who helped him with his campaign. The facts are that with a little more support and a little more money, Roy would have won and the LA Community College District would have had a taxpayer's advocate and fiscal watchdog for the first time since Patrick Owens was defeated for reelection by left-wing unions in 1993.

The Republican Party of Los Angeles County held a special endorsement meeting on Saturday, June 2nd at the Robert A. Virtue Republican Headquarters for the upcoming Special Election in the 37th Congressional District.

our bonds prevent us from speaking up.

Some may argue that we would be more effective if we sanctioned torture or other expedient methods to obtain information from the enemy. They would be wrong. Beyond the basic fact that such actions are illegal, history shows that they also are frequently neither useful nor necessary. Certainly, extreme physical action can make someone "talk;" however, what the individual says may be of questionable value. In fact, our experience in applying the interrogation standards laid out in the Amy Field Manual (2-22.3) on *Human Intelligence Collector Operations* that was published last year shows that the techniques in the manual work effectively and humanely in eliciting information from detainees.

We are, indeed, warriors. We train to kill our enemies. We are engaged in combat, we must pursue the enemy relentlessly, and we must be violent at times. What sets us apart from our enemies in this fight, however, is how we behave. In everything we do, we must observe the standards and values that dictate that we treat noncombatants

and detainees with dignity and respect. While we are warriors, we are also all human beings. Stress caused by lengthy deployments and combat is not a sign of weakness; it is a sign that we are human. If you feel such stress, do not hesitate to talk to your chain of command, your chaplain, or a medical expert.

We should use the survey results to renew our commitment to the values and standards that make us who we are and to spur reexamination of these issues. Leaders, in particular, need to discuss these issues with their troopers - and, as always, they need to set the right example and strive to ensure proper conduct. We should never underestimate the importance of good leadership and the difference it can make.

Thanks for what you continue to do. It is an honor to serve with each of you.

June 14th — Flag Day



The idea of an annual day specifically celebrating the Flag is believed to have first originated in 1885. BJ Cigrand, a schoolteacher, arranged for the pupils in the Fredonia, Wisconsin Public School, District 6, to observe June 14 (the 108th anniversary of the official adoption of The Stars and Stripes) as 'Flag Birthday'. In numerous magazines and newspaper articles and public addresses over the following years, Cigrand continued to enthusiastically advocate the observance of June 14 as 'Flag Birthday', or 'Flag Day'.

Inspired by three decades of state and local celebrations, Flag Day - the anniversary of the Flag Resolution of 1777 - was officially *established* by the Proclamation of President Woodrow Wilson on May 30th, 1916. While Flag Day was celebrated in various communities for years after Wilson's proclamation, it was not until August 3rd, 1949 (63 Stat. 492), that President Truman signed an Act of Congress designating **June 14th** of each year as **National Flag Day**.

It calls for the President to issue an annual proclamation calling for its observance and for the display of the Flag of the United States on all Federal Government buildings. The Congress also requested the President, by joint resolution approved June 9, 1966 (80 Stat. 194), to issue annually a proclamation designating the week in which June 14 falls as "National Flag Week" and calling upon all citizens of the United States to display the Flag during that week.

Political Forum—May 12, 2007

Does the Republican Party need to be more flexible in order to attract votes from outside the Party? Will candidates such as Rudy Giuliani, with his less-than-conservative stands on gun control, gay rights, and abortion, be vote-getters for the GOP, and, if so, are these the kind of candidates we should be fielding? How

much of a compromise can—and should—conservative Republicans make with their personal beliefs in order to win elections? These were the opening questions for debate at May's Forum, led by Michael Lerew preceding lunch and the monthly meeting of Southern California Republican Women and Men. Most members believed that the Party is tolerant to begin with, and that little if any compromise with core Party values is acceptable.

The group then turned to discussion of the recent immigrants' rights rally, which was far smaller than last year's event. Reasons for this ranged from the fact that schools remained in session and there was a greater fear of arrest, but also mentioned was last year's threat of criminalizing illegal immigration by considering it a felony which helped to increase the marchers. Also, local businesses resisted shutting down this year due to loss of income, and the Roman Catholic Church did not play the leadership role it did last year due to numerous other distractions for Church hierarchy.

It was noted that the GOP still needs outreach to the Hispanic community, the fastest-growing sector of the U. S. population, which has been consistently put off by the GOP position on illegal immigration. One suggestion was that the Party stop talking about illegal immigration until we have a clear policy on addressing the issue; others, however, felt that we should not sacrifice principles to get elected, and that the 2006 election loss occurred because people perceived the Party had abandoned its principles.

Also discussed was the issue of alleged police brutality at the immigration rally. Several members criticized comments made by Mayor Villaraigosa and Police Chief Bratton immediately after the incident, noting that there was no time for investigation before they issued their remarks. The media was also criticized, and there was concern that the general impression would be that it's all right to battle the police, but they can't fight back.

The next topic of discussion was Governor Schwarzenegger's proposal to sell the state lottery to a private company in return for a \$37 billion payoff. Funds would still go to schools, but the excess would no longer go to the General Fund, as it does now. Members were divided on the issue, with many citing the misuse of current lottery funds and the likelihood that the \$37 billion would not be spent appropriately.

Other topics discussed included the advisability of raising federal or state gas tax; the president's sinking popularity figures and the implication for GOP candidates in 2008; a summary of the Bush administration's accomplishments, including tax cuts and the judicial record; and opinions on the most important changes to the state GOP. Many felt that the one most important change would be better communication, as well as putting the most important and strongest issues out to the media.

Please join us in June for the next Forum. Let your voice be heard!

The Political Forum, a round table discussion of current topics, sets SCRW&M apart from other Republican organizations. Everyone is encouraged to participate in the discussion and debate of current issues.

Forum begins at 11:30am, prior to the monthly luncheon and adjourns at 12:55 pm.

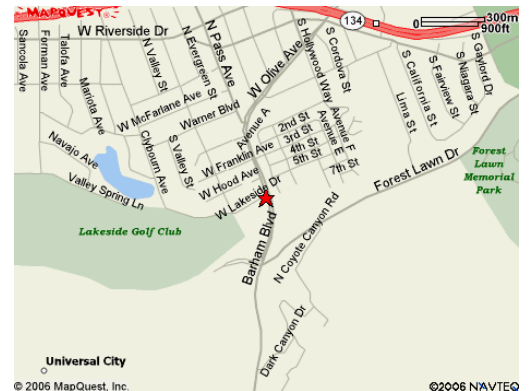
